

Planned Primary PE and Sport Premium Report for 2017/18

The Primary PE and Sport Premium was launched by the government in April 2013. It is ring-fenced funding to be used by the school to improve the quality and breadth of our PE, sport and physical activity provision.

The national vision is for: *“All pupils leaving primary school [to be] physically literate and with the knowledge, skills and motivation necessary to equip them for a healthy lifestyle and lifelong participation in physical activity and sport.”*

In the academic year 2017/18, we will receive £8,900 (+ £1,084 carried forward)

The details below show how we will spend the Premium and what impact it will have on our pupils.

A specialist PE teacher provided PE sessions one afternoon per week to targeted classes (All classes will receive this provision over the year). As a result of the above, the impact on pupils' engagement and achievement in school as a whole			
Attitudes: Engaging more pupils in inter-school competition, and recognising a wider range of achievements in school assemblies and on the school newsletter and website, has increased some pupils' motivation in school generally as they feel more valued and proud of their success.			
Behaviours: Some pupils concentrate better in class in the afternoons as a result of being more active at break and lunchtimes; they have more energy for learning. This is evident in behaviour logs which have shown a drop in behavioural incidents.			
Skills: The number of pupils representing the school at county events such as swimming, cross country and athletics, although still small has risen. Pupils in all classes try very hard to improve in PE.
